Shutt on General John Alexander McClernand, February 9

The controversial Illinois "political general," John Alexander McClernand, will be the subject to be discussed by Philip L. Shutt of Lake Land College, Mattoon, Illinois, at the Civil War Round Table meeting, Friday, February 9, 1973, at the Chicago Bar Association.

In a summary of his talk, Mr. Shutt


"For quite some time I have been interested in presenting a balanced viewpoint on the controversial figure of John A. McClernand so far as his Civil War activities are concerned. At the urging of the late Allan Nevins and

Bruce Catton, I was encouraged to explore the bias held against McClernand by Civil War buffs and during the War itself by the West Pointers around Gen. Grant, and even reaching into the highest Administration sources. My thesis is that McClernand has been more 'sinned against than sinning'. My purpose will be to present facts as I have researched them, which will balance the present attitude of many toward this political general. I do not intend to fight again the battles of Shiloh, Donelson, and Vicksburg!"

Philip L. Shutt was born in Iowa and received his B.A. in Education at Northern Iowa University, Cedar Falls, and an Ed. M. degree after advanced work at the University of Illinois. He has been Instructor in Composition and Journalism at Lake Land College since 1967. He was vice president of the Illinois State Historical Society, 1951-1952. Since 1967 he has been historiographer and archivist for the Episcopal Diocese of Springfield, Illinois, and his definitive history of the Diocese of Springfield is ready for publication. He has served on national archival committees and has done extensive research in local Illinois history, especially in Edgar County. He has spent more than five years gathering material on General John A. McClernand.

from the Editor's pen



Victor Hicken of Western Illinois University, Macomb, in his talk at the January meeting, ranged from the Revolution to Vietnam in comparing the Civil War fighting man with soldiers in other wars. He noted that no general is a hero to present-day college students-but this is nothing new. Kipling nearly a century ago wrote his poem recording that Tommy Atkins was a hero only when the guns begin to shoot. The Eastern press of the 1880s and 1890s bitterly assailed the cavalry that was then riding to the rescue as depicted in TV Westerns. We have fought 9,000 land battles, 1,200 sea fights, and the Marines have made 120 landings, but all of our wars had opposition. There was only one popular war, World War II. (Your editor disagrees here; World War I was as popular as wars get while it was going on and the draft dodging was minimal. A draft dodger, Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, was as ill-known as Benedict Arnold.)

The Civil War soldier was actuated mainly by the concept of duty rather than freedom. Patriotism was a strong feeling in 1861. Adventure and romance were also motives. McClellan was the symbol for the adventurous; Grant represented duty. Motives occasionally were forcibly expressed in other wars. A Bunker Hill veteran put it, "They was tryin' to take away my freedom." A soldier landing in France in 1917 said, "I've come to fight all the kings."

Foreign observers have sized up the American fighting man.

Von Steuben said they would obey, but unlike Europeans, always asked, Why? Henderson noted that in the Civil War obedience was based on intelligence, not habit. Tenacity and aggressiveness were praised down to the days of Merrill's Marauders and Ernie Pyle's "Brave Men." British in the Civil War deplored Grant's wastefulness of men, Sherman's lack of strategic sense, and the misuse of cavalry. Von Borke, however, saw new ideas in entrenching, logistics, and the use of cavalry and guns in the Civil War, and his ideas influenced Prussian military thought.

Opponents commonly looked upon American soldiers as undisciplined, ignorant, and, very frequently stated, "mongrelized." Opinions often changed after action. Rommel saw the Americans as adapting quickly to modern warfare. The Japanese were profoundly shaken by the frontal attacks at Tarawa.

PROMINENT WEST POINTERS

The article following from The Bivouac-An Independent Military Magazine, August, 1883, Vol. I, No. 8, comes to us from our fellow member Alan C. Aimone, military history librarian at USMA, who says the author may have been Thomas Jordon, prolific writer and Confederate classmate of Gen. Thomas:

The value of thorough training in the science of war has been too often demonstrated to be questioned. At the close of the Mexican war General Scott, who was not a graduate of West Point, said: "I give it as my fixed opinion that but for our graduated cadets the war between the United States and Mexico might, and probably would, have lasted some four or five years, with, in its first half, more defeats than victories falling to our share; whereas in less than two campaigns we conquered a great country and a peace, without the loss of a single battle or a skirmish." During the late civil war the generals on both sides who achieved distinction were, with rare exceptions, graduates of the West Point Academy. A very large number of the cadets, after having served the term required by law, drop back into civil life, but there were few classes before the war which did not contain the names of men who have acquired fame. Among those who were at the Academy in my time were Pemberton, Bragg, Beauregard, Thomas, Halleck, Hardee, McDowell, Meigs, and A. J. Smith. The late Major Turner and Bob Renick, of this city, both were there. I remember Pemberton as a handsome boy with black curly hair; genial, companionable, and with a decided talent for drawing and painting. Possibly he would have made a greater name as an artist then he did as a soldier. He was a Philadelphian, and married a young lady from Norfolk, Va., and during the late war he linked his fortunes with the South.

Thomas was a martial-looking young man, about six feet two inches. As he and I were the biggest in the class, he was my file leader for about two years. There was no nonsense about him. He attended strictly to business, and was a model soldier. A Virginian by birth, he married a Troy girl, and when the war came on he took the Union side. Rather suggestive of the influence of a wife. However, Bob Chilton, Lee's Adjutant-General, was a Southern man who married a Michigan girl, the daughter of Governor Mason, and she was rather the more rebellious of the two; but her ancestors were Virginians, which may account for it.

Bragg prided himself on being the ugliest man in the corps. He was a reckless and daring fellow, who was always ready for any sort of a racket. He was one of the few who were addicted to nocturnal excursions to Benny Haven's ranch, and many

were the hairbreadth escapes he and the other frisky ones had in getting back to quarters after a jolly time at "Benny Haven's oh."

McDowell was called the Fat Boy, and from his sobriquet you may know he was good-natured. I think it was Josh Billings who said, "You never heard of a fat man committing murder; no indeed. A fat man never kills any thing that isn't good to eat." McDowell made a good soldier, nevertheless. He, too, married a girl from Troy. The way it happened that so many of the officers were captured by the fair Trojans, they were on General Wool's staff, and he lived there, and during the piping times of peace they fell into the snares of the Troy girls.

Hardee was, to use a current expression, a good deal of a dude. He thought more of his shape than his books. His reputation came largely from the system of tactics which bore his name. He was a pet of Jeff Davis, who, as Secretary of War, appointed him on a board of officers to translate the tactics from the French,-from whence comes our military science,taking care that he should be the ranking officer. So the work took Hardee's name, although the credit belonged to Benet, who was, I think, of French extraction, and a good scholar.

Halleck came of an obscure family, but he was studious and scholarly, and finally married one of the Hamiltons, which set him on the top shelf socially.

Beauregard was French all over. He looked like a Gaul, acted like a Gaul, and his extraction stuck out every way. He was an excellent student, and graduated with high honors.

Meigs was, in my opinion, one of the ablest men in the army, and his career as a cadet gave promise of a brilliant future.—Veteran in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat.


